

I was surprised by how many responses I received. Yes, women keep jewelry in their jewelry boxes, but they also store a wide variety of other things in those treasure chests—everything from baby teeth and safety pins to love letters and military medals.

God Glimpses from the Jewelry Box: Becoming Jewels God Can Use is the first release in the God Glimpses book series. God often mentions jewels in the Bible. And that's awesome since most of us girls love our sparkly accessories.

When we look into our jewelry boxes, it's easy to see the items we keep in there. But what most of us haven't discovered before are the amazing spiritual lessons hiding in our jewelry boxes.

We sometimes act as if God is a million miles away when just the opposite is true. Glimpses of God are present in every aspect of our lives if we'll open our eyes and look around. That's the premise for the *God Glimpses* books: to take important spiritual truths and apply them to ordinary things such as a building project, a visit to the spa, a day at the office, or the items found in a jewelry box or toolbox. We *can* discover God's will and purpose for our lives if we'll just take time to catch a glimpse of Him.

God Glimpses from the Jewelry Box features thirty things found in a woman's jewelry box. Each of the chapters includes a definition of the item and a story with a spiritual application. We've also added a quote, a prayer, and a verse of Scripture to help us on our quest to become priceless jewels in God's jewelry box. A "Jewelry Insurance Inventory Form" at the end of each chapter provides thought-provoking questions suitable for quiet times, family devotions, small groups, or an evening with girlfriends. And all of them will lead to one important question for each of us to consider: What's your treasure?

Silver is a precious metal. It's lightly colored and can be polished to a bright shine. Silver must be cleaned regularly to keep it from tarnishing. It is easily fashioned into new forms and must go through a refining process to remove unwanted materials. Since pure silver is often too soft, sterling silver (which is silver that has been mixed with a small amount of other metals) is usually used for jewelry. Silver jewelry blends well with a variety of fashions and can be worn for any occasion.

SILVER WITHOUT TARNISH

Or we can come out gritty and tarnished because we haven't taken the time to care for our souls. Let's shine for Him, sweetheart."

As Sylvia placed the brooch back into the jewelry box, she whispered, "God, I'm sorry I forgot about you. I think it's time to remove the tarnish from the brooch ... and my life. Thank you for grandparents who left me an inheritance of faith."



Besides being one of the most valuable items in our jewelry boxes, diamonds have some awesome traits. Since they are so costly, one might think that diamonds would be perfect, but if you use a loupe (the magnifying glass used by most jewelers) and take a close look, there are imperfections.

Every prospective groom desires to buy his bride-to-be a quality diamond. He doesn't want one with a murky color or one that isn't cut well. He knows the love of his life will enjoy watching her ring twinkle as she proudly twists her hand in the sunshine.

He'll also discover quickly that the more carats there are in his fiancée's ring, the more money he will shell out, but because he loves her so much, he's willing to pay the price.

AN UNEXPECTED DISCOVERY

Finding jewelry in a jewelry box is a no-brainer, but sometimes special family keepsakes can be found there as well. I have a worn leather notebook in my jewelry box that's one of my most prized possessions. Let me share the story behind that.

I was devastated when my dad passed away. Emptying his house so we could put it on the market was a mammoth task. Dad lived in another state, and we had limited time to pack his belongings, so boxes were packed into the moving truck with just a quick glance at the contents.

Months later I was still going through containers. One box I'd hauled to our den looked like it was all junk. I almost threw everything in the trash without looking through the items, but I'm glad I didn't. I would have thrown away something that's a treasure to me.

You see, buried in that box of junk was a little leather notebook. When I opened it, I found my dad's familiar handwriting, pages filled with details of his journeys as well as names and addresses of his fellow sailors from their time on a ship during World War II.

That was a precious find. The history was fascinating, but then I found the pages that made me cry. They were the ones where my daddy had marked off the days until he'd be home. Page after page of days with check marks beside them.

I have many photos of my dad in his US Navy uniform. The day I found the notebook, I could almost see Dad as a

homesick young sailor sitting on his bunk, missing his family and friends, checking off another day that would bring him that much closer to being home with them again. It was clear that despite the horrible experiences he went through during those times of war, Dad's focus was on making it home.

You know, friends, sometimes we become so focused on the here and now that we forget there's a far more important eternity waiting for us. That's something for all of us to think about.

The first consideration is to have assurance that we're ready to meet God—that we've surrendered our lives, asked forgiveness for our sins, and asked Jesus into our hearts.

And the second consideration? What if we lived our lives in a manner where we were counting the days until we got to be with Jesus? None of us knows how long we have before that day will arrive. For some it might be years away, and for others, it might be soon.

Just as my daddy was faithful to record everyday events in that little notebook that's tucked in my jewelry box, let's keep our focus on doing the job God has for us to do until we get home—and on making it there with our mission accomplished.

But none of these things move me, neither count I my life dear unto myself, so that I might finish my course with joy, and the ministry, which I have received of the Lord Jesus, to testify the gospel of the grace of God.

Pearls are often given as a special gift to commemorate a momentous occasion, such as a bride's wedding day. A strand of pearls is a necklace that's been strung on a silk cord, and it's usually finished off with a decorative clasp. The jeweler makes a knot between each pearl and then gives it a slight pull to tighten the knot. The knotting provides security to prevent multiple pearls from being lost in case of breakage. It also protects the pearls from rubbing against each other, which can result in marring and chipping.

EARRINGS THAT LAST

The baby stared, long lashes blinking. The large round hoop of gold dangled and jangled, and the little one grabbed on with a pudgy fist. Yank! He held on tight. Baby didn't mean to squeeze and twist and pull your ear, but he sure enjoyed your surprised reaction.

That's one thing about earrings. You've really got to mean it when you choose to make that first hole—or your latest. That's because the typical piercing changes your lobe or any number of standard sites. And that alteration becomes permanent. No matter what location you choose, you want to be sure that the earrings are firmly attached. How many times have you retraced your tracks looking for a loose earring that decided to dive for the dirt?

There are, of course, options to pierced ears. Remember Grandma's clip-ons? Often heavy and made of weighty metals, they pulled the poor lobe down toward the ground, but they were easily removed. If the clip-on earrings were backed with a second small clip, they weren't going anywhere unless you chose to remove them.

Earrings come in an endless variety. Some are made of precious stones, wood, or beads. You can find a beautiful pair for a few bucks at a garage sale or spend thousands on diamonds that sparkle by candlelight, but wherever you find them, they're usually purchased by the pair.

A young woman writing a paper hauled piles of books to her table in the library. Hours later, she felt an itch and pulled her ear. One of her diamond earrings was missing! They'd been a gift from her parents. Frantic, she ran to the stacks and looked everywhere, opening and closing volumes, hoping her tiny treasure had been caught in one of them. She returned many times for one more look but without success.

In a similar situation, think about the Good Shepherd who lost one precious lamb and searched until He found it. Rejoice! Our Shepherd *never* gives up on us.

In Bible times, when Rome ruled the earth, those who chose to wholeheartedly serve their masters were called bondservants. Part of the process of giving yourself body and soul to another meant piercing an ear with an awl, a tool that made a small hole (Exodus 21:5–6). Such servants no longer were their own. By their act they stated—and showed—their devotion to another. And the unadorned piercing made the point yet more obvious.



A GLIMMERING REMINDER

The wedding ring truly means something special. For many women, that metallic band is her most priceless possession, not because of its monetary value but because of its eternal significance. The smooth circular rings that the bride and groom give to each other represent life eternal. They have no starting point and no conclusion.

The glowing bride symbolizes the stunning bride of Christ: the church. The marriage vow is a reminder that one day Jesus will come back to take His church—His forgiven people—to a glorious mansion in heaven to rejoice forever at the wedding feast.

You may be satisfied in your singleness, hoping to share your life, or engaged to an amazing man. You could be a starry-eyed newlywed, or maybe you've been crazy in love for decades. Regardless of your status, the wedding ring should make you stop and stare. That's because it serves as a glimmering reminder of who *you* are in Christ and the esteem with which the holy Bridegroom holds you. Regardless of your marital status, no earthly trials can ever displace your position as the beloved bride of Jesus.

What else makes the ring so special? It often boasts an engraved date or short phrase expressing lifetime love. With rare exceptions, this ring stays on your left ring finger, which is traditionally believed to have a vein, the vena amoris, which connects straight to the heart. That's why your engagement ring—no matter how stunning—is placed closer

to your fingertip while the wedding ring stays closest to your heart. What a wonderful reminder of the love that binds you.

The ring itself represents a circle with no beginning or end, but there is far more to that imagery. Reflect also that the wearer resides within a precious sphere of protection. No forces or influences that might unravel your vows should ever be brought inside that small circle meant only for two. Neither partner should ever venture outside that intimate space to seek comfort and emotional strength from another. Such actions could damage the very soul of your marriage.

Some see a wedding ring as a mere bit of jewelry, an accessory, not a lifelong pledge. Something to be removed as the mood strikes. Look at your tiny reflection shimmering like a gem on the flat edge of your wedding ring, and take an inventory of what's most important to you. That plain holy band should mean the world to you.

God—your Bridegroom—wants to be your love for a lifetime. The next time you stroke your fingers across the smoothness of your wedding ring, take a minute to thank Him for the spouse He's blessed you with, and then thank Him for the oh-so-precious privilege of having Him choose *you* to be His bride.



To be asked to watch over a soldier's military medals signifies that you have been significantly honored. You mean a great deal to the giver to be safekeeping such a treasure now. These remembrances take many forms. Whether it is one stripe on the left sleeve for every three years of service or one stripe on the right for every six months deployed to a combat zone, the symbol of service means far more than its component parts.

You might be the mother, wife, sweetheart, or sister of a military man (or it might have been you who served your country). A badge depicts recognition for a skill set like air assault, combat medical, combat action, expert field medical skills, and many others. The soldier's dedication and love of country are obvious.

Some of you (like my friend Adam Meister who humbly spoke with me about his Purple Hearts) may even possess a Purple Heart—the ultimate symbol of sacrifice, which is presented in the name of our nation's president. A soldier must have been injured or died fighting against the enemy. A Purple Heart can be earned multiple times but will only be issued once per military campaign or deployment. Look closely. If you see a star above President Washington's head, that represents multiple Purple Hearts given to the service member. For subsequent injuries, bronze and silver oak leaf clusters are granted as symbols of gratitude.

Our military lays down many personal freedoms and desires in order to serve. What integrity. What strength

of character. These stalwart souls do not know when, and sometimes if, they will be coming back to their families. Or in what condition. As fellow citizens, we should be proud of those who have given up so much for us—in some cases even giving their lives for their country.

Jesus Christ laid down His life for all humanity. Though sinless, He experienced the pain of sin. Through His oncefor-all sacrifice, we can live in complete assurance that heaven will one day be our home.

His sacrifice gives us life and freedom. And our military men and women protect that liberty, often at great cost. Whenever you take a moment to examine that Purple Heart or other military medal, close your eyes and picture the person who earned it. His or her bravery, perseverance, courage, and spirit keep us safe and secure.



Others are old-fashioned with entwining filigree, or they're layered to give the heart depth and visual appeal.

The heart necklace is found everywhere because it's really the "happy face" of the jewelry industry. Who can argue with a heart? It makes you feel good and proclaims a certain message to the world. Namely, it says that you have someone special in your life. Maybe even the person who gave it to you.

The thought of a happy heart just makes us smile. It's the symbol of love, friendship, and all-around good times. Wearing a heart seems to say, "I am loved. Special. Look, all of you! Someone cares about me." Or you may have bought it for yourself (and there's nothing wrong with that) because you hope to one day meet the man who will capture your heart.

If left

untreated, a wounded heart can fester, releasing bitterness, anger, and fear into our lives.

But it's hard when our heart hurts. We want a loving relationship but have a less than perfect marriage. Or maybe a friend has shattered us with a lie or a child has broken our heart. Perhaps we are betrayed by a coworker who has promised to stand at our side, or a loved one has shared something that has rocked our faith. No matter how firm and strong we appear, a tender heart can be easily broken.

It is difficult to fully give over your heart. To do so takes the ultimate confidence in another. When you put yourself in someone else's hand, you risk disappointment, pain, and rejection. Thankfully, we know from Scripture that "the LORD is nigh unto them that are of a broken heart; and saveth such as be of a contrite spirit" (Psalm 34:18).

The next time you slip on your sweet sentimental jewelry, consider your own expectant heart. God gave you that solid, steady beat, and He can be trusted. Wholeheartedly.

They weren't particularly bright, but they knew gold when they saw it. Or at least they thought they did. In a hurry, they grabbed the shiniest chains and bracelets from the ornate jewelry box. When the family returned, the dressing area was in shambles. Then the lady of the house started laughing. The criminals had taken only her brightest bling, not her best. Her gold-plated costume pieces were gone, but her most treasured pieces, though in plain sight, remained safely behind.

WHAT LIES BENEATH?

It's easy to wrap a tawdry nickel necklace in a thin layer of gleaming gold to give it visual appeal. Gold-plated or filled jewelry isn't the same as genuine gold jewelry. Not by a long shot. In simplest terms, it's like taking a cheap metal locket or alloy rolo chain and dousing it with gold spray paint. The process of gold plating is more complex, but the result is the same. An item is disguised as something it's not.

Thankfully, certain signs can help us to discern the truth. Real gold is marked with a sign indicating the purity. Any jeweler will tell you such pieces may be stamped 12K or 12KT to mean "12-karat" gold. Honest craftsmen and distributors clearly tag their creations with GP or GF for "gold-plated" or "gold-filled" jewelry, respectively.

This allows us to purchase a piece that is designed to shine with the beauty of real gold while proclaiming that it's not. Still, some unwary buyers fail to look for such disclaimers and pay too much for something worth far too little.

Gold must be at least 10 karats to be considered genuine, and 24 is the maximum. Interestingly, 24-karat gold is too soft to fashion an entire chain. Ironically, then, if a sizeable piece of jewelry appears brilliant yellow like fine gold, it's probably not. Such gold may appear bright but the beauty is not to be believed. Another sure sign of a fake is discovered after time when the gold plating wears off and the core shows through. If it's real, it's real through and through.

Finally, there is the proverbial acid test that reveals the

actual content of any glittery golden metal. A sample of snake chain, for example, can be verified when scratched gently on a touchstone. Nitric acid is then daubed on the mark, and the chemical reaction tells the story. The stronger the acid required to dissolve the mark, the higher the quality of gold. There's no way to hide the truth. A fire assay, by contrast, will destroy your jewelry and leave behind only the purest particles of gold.

God similarly tests our hearts, warming us slowly in life's pressure cooker, burning away the impurities. During terrible trials when the veneer wears thin, do we dare look at what's below the surface? Are we made of God's glorious gold or something less precious? "And I will turn my hand upon thee, and purely purge away thy dross, and take away all thy tin" (Isaiah 1:25). May you know for sure, sooner rather than later.

The fear of the LORD is clean, enduring for ever: the judgments of the Lord are true and righteous altogether. More to be desired are they than gold, yea, than much fine gold: sweeter also than honey and the honeycomb.



umerous jewelry items are available that express our religious beliefs. Necklaces with crosses, the passion nail, or the mustard seed are some examples. The prayer locket necklace includes a tiny box for placing one's special prayer requests, and there are charm bracelets that feature the Ten Commandments or Noah's ark. Religious-themed jewelry shares our faith in a visible way. When we wear this jewelry, we are giving a soundless testimony about what we believe and what is important to us.

A QUIET TESTIMONY

We've all seen women (and men) wearing religious jewelry, and most of us have at least one piece in our jewelry boxes. So why do people wear faith-themed jewelry? There are a variety of reasons—but they all have one thing in common: these pieces are a testimony of our faith and our love for God.

Think about some of the different pieces. The cross is an obvious one as it's a reminder of the sacrifice God made for all of us. Some crosses are ornate, some are simple, and still others have been crafted from two passion nails to represent the nails that pierced the hands and feet of Jesus as He gave His life on that rugged cross in place of ours.

A mustard seed necklace provides a reminder that it only takes a tiny bit of faith to move mountains. Most of us need frequent reminders about that, but can you imagine how much comfort that brings to someone facing a doctor's diagnosis of a terminal illness, or someone in the midst of a dire financial situation?

Small prayer box necklaces provide a secure place to put special prayer requests so folks can wear them around their necks, keeping those requests close to their hearts.

Purity rings are worn as reminders to young women to keep their hearts and bodies pure until their wedding night. I wonder how many girls have been in potentially compromising situations and looked down or felt that ring and escaped temptation. It's always a sweet part of a wedding when the bride swaps her purity ring for a wedding ring.

There are angel pins, necklaces, and bracelets—simple tokens to remind us that His angels are watching over us each and every day.

Other necklaces include silver boxes with the words *Holy Bible* on them or the Star of David. And sometimes there are inspiring messages or verses of Scripture on them, such as, "I can do all things through Christ which strengtheneth me" (Philippians 4:13).

No matter what piece of religious jewelry we put on, we need to remember we're giving a message when we wear it. We're making a statement that says, *This is what I believe*.

And that's an important reminder for all of us when we sport those pieces of jewelry—others are watching to see how we really live. It might be years down the road, but somewhere along the way, I can promise you someone will say, "I've been watching you to see how you lived for God." Are we good representatives of Him, or does our jewelry say one thing and our lives and testimonies say something else?

It has hooks for hanging necklaces, cushioned areas for rings, and compartments for earrings and bracelets. And then the mirror is right there for you to see how each item will look.

Sweet friends, we need to take just as much care with our hearts as we do with our jewelry boxes. Just as my daughter-in-law bought her jewelry box, God paid the price for us. Did you get that? He looked at us and saw something valuable, someone He could use. We're not God's discarded jewelry;

we're His priceless gems. Like glancing at a mirrored jewelry armoire—we need to take a look into His mirror of grace so we'll see the valuable jewels He made in us.

So why are we living as if we're costume jewelry when we're one of His precious gems? We need to get rid of the junk in our lives, untangling the jumbled messes we've made. Just like the nonabrasive lining in our jewelry boxes, we need to line our hearts with His Word, locking out things that would be harmful for us and polishing our hearts with prayer so that no tarnish is found there. 


GOD GLIMPSES FROM THE TOOLBOX USING TOOLS TO BUILD MEN OF CHARACTER
