Why Pray for My Children?

hy is it important to dedicate the time or make it a priority to pray for your children? Setting aside thirty-one days to pray for your kids makes sense for many reasons. Here are just a few of them:

• As we pray for our children, we're joining Jesus as He prays on their behalf.

Hebrews tells us that Jesus "lives forever to intercede with God on [our] behalf" (Hebrews 7:25). And the book of Romans reminds us that "he is sitting in the place of honor at God's right hand, pleading for us" (Romans 8:34). Don't you imagine the Savior's prayer list includes your children? When you pray, you have the privilege of joining Jesus in prayer for them.

• As we pray for our children, we're joining Jesus in His celebrations.

In Christ's last moments on earth, He revealed His loving desire for us: "that My joy may be in you, and that your joy may be made full" (John 15:11 NASB). Jesus finds joy in your children and in your family. Since family is a special representation of Christ's love, He feels a special joy when He sees families thriving. He loves when our relationships are a testimony to a hurting world. When you pray, you

have the privilege of joining Jesus in a celebration of the beauty of family (see Psalm 127:3).

• As we pray for our children, we're joining Jesus in His concern.

Raising children is hard at times. Jesus feels compassion for the struggles in your family and any challenges you or your children might be facing. His heart is moved with compassion when He sees you or your family hurting, disappointed, discouraged, or alone. So join Jesus in praying for your son or daughter, lifting up concerns and asking the Lord to give you a deeper understanding of your child's heart. Praying for your children allows the Holy Spirit to help you see what He sees so you can love them the way Jesus loves (see 2 Corinthians 1:2–4).

• As we pray for our children, we strengthen our own walk with Jesus.

Spending time with our Savior deepens our closeness with Him. As you pray, the Spirit will minister to your heart, to your needs, and to your concerns. Parents, let's pray for our children! Let's pray often. Let's pray consistently. Let's pray boldly. Let's pray faithfully (see Romans 8:26–27).

How to Pray for My Children

T his world—where the prince of darkness seeks to steal, kill, and destroy families—needs Christ followers who walk in the light (see John 10:10; 12:35 NASB). For the next thirty-one days, we encourage you to take a journey of walking in the light. During your times of prayer, you will walk in the light of God's Son, God's Word, and God's people (see John 8:12; Matthew 5:14; Psalm 119:105).

As you take this journey, you will spend moments in personal prayer but also pray for your children. You'll pray for your children to:

- encounter Jesus in fresh, new ways,
- live out the Bible frequently, and
- interact with people by demonstrating God's love.

Let's try one of your own fresh encounters with Jesus. As you read these words from the Savior, imagine that He's speaking directly to you. Listen for His compassionate, strong voice. He's thrilled to share these moments with you.

PRAY: LISTEN TO JESUS

The darkness of this world is all around you, and I don't want your family to be overtaken. I have a plan. I have a plan for your protection, guidance, and strength. If you'll spend time with me, my Word, and my people, darkness won't have a chance in your family. As you encounter me, I will protect you, because I'm the Light of the World. Let my Word guide you and light your way. Let my people encourage you and give you strength. Walking in the light is the best place to be because that means we're walking together (see John 8:12; Matthew 5:14; Psalm 119:105).

Now voice your personal prayer to Jesus:

- Jesus, when I look at the darkness of this world, I feel especially concerned about _____.
- Lord, I am grateful for your protection, guidance, and strength, particularly because _____.
- * Jesus, I also pray for my children. I pray they would come to know you and spend more time with you, your Word, and your people so darkness doesn't have a chance in our home and in our family.
- I pray you would protect my children from _____.
- * I pray you would guide my children in _____.
- * I pray you would strengthen my children in _____.

As you continue this journey of prayer, remember the goal: Your times of prayer can't just be focused on training your children. These moments with Jesus and His Word are designed to first develop Christlikeness within you. The destination of your journey is a person, and His name is Jesus. As you spend time focused on getting to know Christ and experiencing more of His love, and as you spend time focused on living out His Word, not just reading or hearing it, you'll become more like Him. This journey will change something—and hopefully it's you.

You may be thinking: *My children need to change in some areas*. *Our family needs to be stronger, closer, or different in certain ways*. *What can I do?*

Here are a few things you can do:

Pray. Have your own encounters with Jesus, and see what changes He might want to make in you.

Live. Consistently live out God's Word and *do* the Bible in your home. Watch His Word make a difference in your life and in the lives of your children.

Act. Use the ideas from this resource and take practical action steps. Take initiative to love your children in practical, relevant ways.

Pray, live, and act. Then watch the power of God's Son, His Word, and His people make a difference in your children and in your family.



What to Pray for My Children

This book is designed to foster a Spirit-empowered faith—a faith that is demonstrable, observable, and only possible with the empowerment of the Holy Spirit. A framework for this kind of spiritual growth has been drawn from a cluster analysis of several Greek and Hebrew words that declare that Christ's followers are to be equipped for works of service (see Ephesians 4:12). Therefore, in *31 Days of Prayer for My Children*, you'll find specific sections that are designed around four themes (see Appendix 3, page 125). A Spirit-empowered disciple

- Loves the Lord (see Luke 10:38–42). You will find seven days of prayer marked L1, L2, L3, L4, L7, L8, and L10.
- Lives the Word (see 2 Corinthians 3:2). You will find seven days of prayer marked W2.
- Loves People (see Ephesians 4:29). You will find seven days of prayer marked P3.
- Lives His Mission (see 1 Thessalonians 2:8). You will find seven days of prayer marked M1.

Our world needs families who live as Spirit-empowered disciples who are making disciples who, in turn, make disciples. Thus, *31 Days of Prayer for My Children* rightly focuses on the powerful simplicity of

- loving God,
- living His Word,
- loving people, and
- living His mission.

After three days of prayer focused on why, how, and what to pray for your children, we will turn our attention to specific prayer themes. Before we focus on these thematic prayers, however, we invite you to live out God's Word. God tells us that if we ask anything according to His will, He hears us and grants our request (see 1 John 5:14–15). We know it's His will for us to love our children well, so we can count on Him to grant this request.

Spend the next few moments in prayer. Make your request to God and look for how He gives to you. Jesus said, "If you ask the Father for anything in My name, He will give it to you" (John 16:23 NASB).

LIVE: DO THE BIBLE

God, I know it's your will for me to love my children well, so I'm asking you to give me whatever I need to love the way you want me to love. If I need to change, show me. If I need to see things differently, I'm ready. I'm asking these things in your name, knowing that you'll answer my prayer and give me what I ask for. In Jesus' name, amen.

Closer to Him

May we talk to and listen to God in prayer for our daily decisions and direction for life as a demonstration of our love for Him.

STORIES FROM A PARENT'S HEART

I struggled throughout my life with overwork. My wife and I argued about family priorities often; we were definitely in agreement about this challenge. My wife told me that I was way too preoccupied with things at the office. I tried to change, even shedding tears on many occasions over my compulsion to work and my tendency to neglect our family.

This dilemma of parenting led us to a counselor's office. One day, with tears streaming down my cheeks, I shared, "You know, I think a major reason why I don't go home is that I'm afraid. I'm afraid that I don't know how to be a father. I know my children need me, but I'm not sure I know how to give to them. I feel adequate at work, but I don't feel adequate with my own children."

I've also discovered that I'm not alone in this struggle. Many parents—fathers and mothers alike—feel inadequate with their own children. Parenting isn't easy. Raising spiritually, emotionally, and physically healthy children can be incredibly challenging at times. That's why our first goal as a parent is to become a disciple—a learner, one who is taught, one who listens to and follows Jesus.

PRAY: LISTEN TO JESUS

I long to have quiet moments of conversation with you. I love when you are still and free of distractions, because those are the times when you can truly feel my love. I have equipped you with everything you need, so come to me often and I'll remind you of my gifts. I especially enjoy seeing you pray together as a family. When all of us come together in prayer, miraculous things can happen. Remember, I am the God of love. So it's in these quiet moments of time with me that I can be your unlimited source of sacrificial love (see Psalm 46:10; 2 Timothy 3:17; 1 John 4:8).

- * Jesus, I ask that you quiet my mind and my spirit. Help me to focus on you. In my relationship with my kids, I am depending upon you to _____. Sometimes I don't know how to _____, so I'm counting on you to teach me _____.

- * God, I pray for my children. They need to know that you care about these challenges. Please reassure them of your love. They need you to intervene and equip in this situation because _____.

TAKE ACTION

- Invite your children to pray with you about any decisions they may be facing. Ask God to give you both clear direction and certainty.
- Invite your children to pray with you about any struggles or hardships they may be facing. Ask the Lord for wisdom and guidance. Let your children hear you call upon the heavenly Father and voice your trust in His care. Look for how God answers, and then be sure to celebrate His provision.

Living Out Our Identity

May we come to live joyfully and confidently in our identity as one who is loved by God and belongs to Him.

STORIES FROM A PARENT'S HEART

T 've discovered that no single factor is more closely associated with successful growing up than one's sense of identity: *Who am I*? Identity is sometimes thought of as one's internalized picture of oneself. Thus, people can like, dislike, or even hate themselves. This is just one reason why shaping a child's sense of identity is of major importance in the parenting journey.

We all have an eternal significance to our Creator; we have a special identity to Him. As a parent, I have the privilege for a few short years to affirm the identity that the Father has declared in my children. Here's what God says is true about my children: God has declared them worth the gift of His Son. God says that His deepest desire is that my children belong to His family—as joint-heirs with Jesus. God says that as my children come to follow Jesus, they are blessed with every spiritual blessing and can do all things through Christ (see Romans 6:23; 8:16–17; Ephesians 1:3; Philippians 4:13).

As our children come to embrace their incalculable worth to the heavenly Father, find security in their belonging as joint heirs with Christ, and experience the competency of every spiritual blessing, they will enter adult life prepared and motivated to lead the life that God intends.

PRAY: LISTEN TO JESUS

You are a treasure. My Father has declared that you are worth the gift of His Son. You are one of the majestic ones in whom I delight. Remember, dear one: You belong to a royal family. You are a joint heir in my kingdom; you belong to me, as I belong to my Father. Since you are a member of our family, you have been blessed with every spiritual blessing. You can do everything that you need to do as you find your strength in me. Children are gifts from me. Gifts are to be treasured, valued, studied, protected, and cherished (see Psalms 16:3; 127:3; Romans 6:23; 8:16–17; Philippians 4:13; 1 Corinthians 3:23).

- Affirm your children's *competence* by encouraging them to try new skills. Look for ways to support and build their confidence. Set goals with your children and celebrate when they are accomplished.

May we cultivate a spirit of gratitude and thanksgiving as a demonstration of our love for the Lord.

STORIES FROM A PARENT'S HEART

onder and awe must have been at least part of what Mary felt when she made her joyful declaration to God: "My soul magnifies the Lord" (Luke 1:46 ESV). Mary's exaltation and gratitude were not about possessions, position, or status, but about relationship. As the most blessed of all women, Mary's blessing came through a divinely provided relationship. Her exaltation and worship were responses to gifts from the Father.

In a similar way, those of us who have children have been divinely blessed with gifts from the Lord (see Psalm 127:3). The apostle James also reminds us that every good and perfect gift comes down from the Father above (see James 1:17). The same God who blessed Mary with His announcement of Christ has given us some of His most special gifts. They are the good (and sometimes perfect) gifts my God has given me. Because of this, my soul magnifies the Lord.

PRAY: LISTEN TO JESUS

In case you're unsure of how to connect with me, I've given you a hint: Thank me. I've given you everything you enjoy every breath you breathe and every relationship you call dear. It's my absolute joy to give, yet it hurts my heart when the ones I love forget to say thank you. I feel loved and honored when I hear your words of gratitude. My followers who have learned to acclaim me walk in my presence and find great blessing. Your gratitude keeps us close (see Psalms 50:23; 69:30; 89:15; 1 Thessalonians 5:18).

- * Jesus, I don't ever want you to feel disappointed because I forget to say thank you. When I imagine how much you have given to me and our family and how you might experience hurt because of my lack of gratitude, I feel _____.
- Lord, I don't want to forget to say thank you for my children. Remind me of all the ways my children are a special blessing from you. Keep me from being critical, negative, or harsh. I'm grateful you have given them to me because _____.

Be a Bethany

STORIES FROM A PARENT'S HEART

B ethany was a small town, two miles outside of Jerusalem. The city was the home of three of Christ's friends—Mary, Martha, and Lazarus. Aside from that fact, the town was pretty insignificant. Bethany didn't have great historical, political, or even religious importance, but Jesus seemed to go out of His way to get there. I wonder why?

Bethany was a place of refuge for Jesus. It was a place where people He loved wanted to share moments of worship with Him. Bethany was the place where Mary chose to sit at Jesus' feet and hear the vulnerable places of His heart. Jesus must have loved being in Bethany because it was a place where He could both give and receive love (see Luke 10:38–42).

Jesus has this same desire for His relationship with you. Christ longs for you and your family to be His Bethany; He longs for you to be the place where He can give and receive love.

PRAY: LISTEN TO JESUS

Dear one, I am hoping that you will be my Bethany. I am hoping to have a special, one-of-a-kind friendship with you. I want to share my joy with you. I want to share the things that have saddened my heart with you. Just like in Bethany, I want to lavishly give and receive love from you. I am ready to share closeness and vulnerable moments just with you (see Proverbs 3:32).

TAKE ACTION

- Attend corporate worship services with your children. Remind them that singing praise songs is one way to worship the Lord and tell others how great He is!
- Start a book of blessings, where you ask the Lord to remind you of the great things He has done for you and your family. Record them in the book. Reminisce about these blessings, then pray and worship together as a family.

A Student of My Child

May we demonstrate our love for the Lord by imitating Him and living out His kindness for one another.

STORIES FROM A PARENT'S HEART

In families, kindness means discerning the unique needs of a specific person. It involves taking the initiative to express care based on what you know of them. Kindness requires becoming a lifelong "student" of each person in the family—seeking to understand everyone so you can best love them.

The apostle Peter referred to this when he encouraged husbands to "live with your wives in an understanding way" (1 Peter 3:7 NASB). Proverbs encourages a wife to "open her mouth in wisdom and [let] the teaching of kindness [be] on her tongue. She looks well to the ways of her household" (31:26–27 NASB). And Scripture reminds us that *everyone* who has been called by God is to put on a heart of compassion and kindness (see Colossians 3:12).

I can show Nicholas kindness like no one else because I know him so well. For example, I buy the brand of T-shirts he feels most comfortable in, and I cut his sandwiches in triangles because that's his favorite shape! I try to prioritize time for Nicholas to play with Caleb, because Nicholas says they are both good at sharing. I know Kara likes to hang out with her friend Chloe, but always at our house, because sometimes the two of them can get into disagreements. I make a special effort to straighten Chloe's covers at night because she can't sleep if they're "all crooked." These demonstrations of kindness are possible because I've learned to be a student of my children. I'm praying that my demonstrations of kindness are just a small way I can imitate the kindness the Lord has shown to me.

PRAY: LISTEN TO JESUS

Remember, my beloved: I am wonderfully kind, patient, and tolerant of you. It was my kindness, in spite of your sin, that first drew you into a relationship with me. Now I'm giving you the opportunity to share some of that kindness with your children. Pay it forward every day. Look for ways to demonstrate kindness with others. Take thought of others just as I think of you a thousand times a day. Finally, remember that sharing truth with one another is important, but that truth needs to be coupled with kindness (see Romans 2:4; Proverbs 3:3; Ephesians 4:15; Psalm 139:17).

- Compliment your children on their appearance. Encourage compliments of others: "Let's think of a compliment that we can give to ______ today!"

Baseball and Boldness

May we demonstrate our love for God by talking to Him consistently, praying with boldness and trusting Him to answer.

STORIES FROM A PARENT'S HEART

T t started out as a "good experience" and an opportunity to play with a team that matched our son's athletic ability. But the baseball season ended with angry coaches and stressed-out kids. Needless to say, my husband and I were relieved when the last game rolled around.

Wayne and I had been praying together for weeks, asking God to show us how to navigate the stressful situations and conflicted relationships. We prayed for God to get us through without losing our tempers. On that last Saturday morning, we finally decided to include our son, Jonathan, in our final conversation and prayer. We talked about how this season had been good at times and hard at times. We talked about how Jonathan had learned a lot about baseball and made some new friends. Then out of a little guilt and desperation, we asked Jon to pray with us.

In his matter-of-fact eight-year-old voice, our son taught us a

huge lesson in prayer. Here's what he said: "God, I know you can answer my prayer. I just hope you help us have a good game today. I want to play good, but I really want you to help me and my team have fun. Amen." It was a simple, bold, and faith-filled prayer.

God answered Jon's prayer in more ways than we could have imagined that day. The team won the game we were "supposed" to lose. Coaches relaxed and helped the boys play hard but have fun. And Jonathan hit his first out-of-the park home run. That day began a new discipline of including our kids in times of prayer. That day began a new discipline of praying with boldness and praying with faith.

PRAY: LISTEN TO JESUS

Trust me completely, then look for how I will provide. I am your security; you can count on my faithfulness. My faithfulness is as enduring as the heavens. Your demonstration of faith in me makes my heart sing. There are great blessings in store for the ones who put their faith in me: the faith-filled receive my protection, my favor, and a place of undeserved privilege. STORIES FROM A PARENT'S HEART

hat kind of God do you have? We all have different perceptions of God's character and a slightly different view of how He relates to us.

Do you have an inspecting God? Is it almost as if He has a heavenly tally sheet and carefully records everything you do? This kind of God inspects your every move and then relates to you according to how many good marks or bad marks have been given.

Do you have a disappointed God? Does He look at you and seem to never like what He sees? He may notice your attempt at living a good life, but ultimately shakes His head in disappointment.

Do you have a distant or uninvolved God? This kind of God is often too busy to notice your small concerns. He hears you and you talk to Him, but He sits behind His big desk and gives only half-hearted attention. He's nice but maybe too distracted with "more important" things.

The real God is much different than these so-called Gods. He's attentive and caring. The real God's care is so deep and so strong that even a mother's love pales in comparison. He thinks of you so often and is so excited about the possibility of relationship with you that He's "tattooed" your name on the palm of His hand (see Isaiah 49:16). He's not inspecting; He's admiring His creation in you. The real God is excited to love you!

PRAY: LISTEN TO JESUS

There's nothing stronger than a parent's love. In fact, I see that love every time our Father looks at you. Remember, our Father is pleased with you, and He knows you by name. He isn't disappointed or angry with you. Our Father isn't busy inspecting you either; His loving-kindness is new every morning. It's also important to remember that our Father isn't distant from you or disinterested in your life. He's with you— He'll never leave you—and He's so attentive that His thoughts about you are too numerous to count.

I also see the joy in your face when you take time to truly see your own children. Children are some of the Father's most precious gifts, so be sure to take the time to unwrap and admire them. Parenting is hard, so let me be your provider and guide. Just ask me for help, for I love to give it to you (see Exodus 33:12; Lamentations 3:23; Hebrews 13:5; Psalms 25:5; 40:5; 127:3; Matthew 7:11).

STORIES FROM A PARENT'S HEART

J 've decided to declare myself a cheerleader for my kids. At least once a week, I make it a point to tell Adam and Elise how much I believe in them. I cheer them on when things are hard at school or when they get weary of the stress of performing in the school band. I write a special note for my son for his big days on the soccer field. I text Elise just to remind her that I love her and I'm praying for her. I show Adam that I believe in him by not taking over when he's doing his homework or telling him how to do a job around the house. And I make a special effort to speak confidently about my daughter's abilities in front of her friends.

Encouragement isn't just for hard times; it's not just something to give as a last resort. Encouragement is continued gratitude for your child. It means I share hope about my children's future or how they will accomplish their dreams. I say words such as, "Elise, I'm amazed at how responsible you are. You get your science done without any help from me. I know you want to be a pediatrician someday. You're well on your way!" Encouragement also means that I share words of excitement about their future: "Adam, God has given you a special gift with younger children. You're going to be an awesome dad one day!"

PRAY: LISTEN TO JESUS

Come to me when you are discouraged or weary. Come closer to me when life is hard. I can give you rest. While you are in this world, there will be trouble, but take heart, I have overcome the troubles of this world. Remember that I can fill you with joy and peace in the midst of hard times. I am able to give you sufficiency and abundance for everything I have called you to do (see Matthew 11:28; Romans 15:13; 2 Corinthians 9:8; John 16:33).

STORIES FROM A PARENT'S HEART

My son is so different from me. I am laid back, while he's high-energy and strong-willed. I'm flexible, while he's a perfectionist. I'm quiet and reserved, while he's outgoing and likes lots of attention. When my life gets stressful, these differences can make him seem—from my perspective—demanding, loud, and out of control. Those character traits are difficult for me to accept at times.

I have learned that acceptance doesn't necessarily mean condoning a child's behavior; rather, it means looking deeper than someone's actions to see that person's true worth, just as God does with me. Jesus met my ultimate need for acceptance in that while I was still a sinner, He died for me (see Romans 5:8). He looked beyond my faults and saw and met my needs. God's love for me is unmerited (I don't deserve it and can't earn it). It is unconditional (it's not based on what I do or don't do). God's acceptance of me is unlimited (it will never run out or be detained). When I remind myself of how Christ accepts me, it empowers me to patiently parent my very "different" child.

PRAY: LISTEN TO JESUS

Acceptance is a divine commodity. It's only available from me. You must receive it before you can give it. When my Father allowed me to die in your place, He made a deliberate choice to look beyond your imperfections, inadequacies, and sin to accept you as you are. He also loves you so much that His Spirit won't leave you as you are. His unconditional acceptance is permanent. There is nothing you can do to earn it or lose it. Now I see you as one who is favored, righteous, and worth my blessings (see Romans 5:8; Psalm 5:12; Numbers 6:24–26; Romans 15:7).

- Jesus, you loved me and died for me in spite of my ______. I am filled with gratitude for how you have looked beyond my ______. You see me as one who is favored and righteous even though I ______. Help me accept my children as they are, focusing instead on the changes you desire to make in me.

Tears of Comfort

May we love God's Word and live it out as we comfort one another.

STORIES FROM A PARENT'S HEART

J esus ministered comfort throughout His ministry on earth. He often identified with the hurts of others to the degree that He wept with them in their pain (see John 11:35; Luke 19:41). God is the God of all comfort, and the Holy Spirit is often referred to as the Comforter (see 2 Corinthians 1:3; John 14:16). To give comfort means to give strength and hope, to ease the grief or pain of another, to console, and to mourn with those who are mourning.

It's important to learn to recognize times when your children have an increased need for comfort. Watch for times when your children might have experienced rejection or disappointment; when they are physically ill or under stress; when a tragedy has occurred; or when they have gone through a time of loss.

When your children need comfort, refrain from correction ("The reason that happened is ..."), teaching ("Next time ..."), giving a pep talk ("Come on, it's a beautiful day outside!"), or giving advice ("If you would just ..."). Instead, learn to identify with the feelings of your children and then hurt with them. Comfort is an emotional need and is only met with an emotional response.

Finally, in order to give comfort, you'll want to develop your compassion vocabulary. It will include phrases like

- "I'm so sorry that you're hurting."
- "I hurt for you."
- "I'm here for you."
- "I feel compassion for you because _____."
- "It hurts my heart to hear you say _____."

These phrases can be communicated verbally or in writing.

PRAY: LISTEN TO JESUS

Just as I was moved with compassion for my Son, I hurt deeply when I see your sadness, disappointment, and hurt. I will never, ever leave you comfortless. My love, comfort, hope, strength, and grace are always available for you. I am the God of all comfort, so when you're called upon to give compassion to another, call on me (see John 11:1–34; 14:18; 2 Corinthians 1:3–4).

- * Jesus, when I imagine that the Savior of the universe hurts for me, cries for me, and is moved with compassion for me, I feel ______. As I receive your care and comfort, let my heart be moved with compassion for others.

It's Good for the Soul

May we love God's Word and live it out, especially as we confess our sins to one another.

STORIES FROM A PARENT'S HEART

I n our family, we hurt each other. We don't mean to, but we do. Unfortunately, those hurts don't simply go away on their own. Time doesn't spontaneously heal resentments. We need to confess the sin behind the hurt and ask each other for forgiveness.

It's sobering to realize that my impatience, my unloving attitude, and my harsh words are the kinds of sin that sent Christ to the cross. Experiencing His redemption and forgiveness frees me to confess my sins and ask Him to forgive me.

As God challenges me to look at how I've hurt others (my children included) and to grieve my hurtful actions, He also promises that He has forgiven me, and it is safe for me to confess my sin to the people I love most. It's still hard for me to say to my child, "Marisa, I know that my words hurt your feelings. I was wrong. Please forgive me." But I know it is the first step to the freedom of forgiveness. When my daughter says back to me, "Thank you, Mom. I forgive you," I feel cleansed.

I encourage you to practice confession and forgiveness with your kids. First, take time alone to list ways in which you may have hurt your children. Ask yourself, "Have I been selfish, critical, negative, insensitive, disrespectful, verbally abusive, or not attentive?" Then take your list and confess each item to God, then receive His forgiveness and then your children's. Finally, when those inevitable family conflicts occur, encourage your children to share confessions with one another. Experience the freedom of forgiveness.

PRAY: LISTEN TO JESUS

Confession is hard, but it has great reward. Your confession admitting your wrong actions, attitudes, and behaviors keeps us in right relationship with one another. You have less worry, guilt, and anxiety when you practice confession with me. When you admit your sin, you can count on my forgiveness. It's a promise. Confessing to another person brings the promise of healing in that relationship too (see 1 John 1:9; Psalms 38:18; 51:1–9; James 5:16; Lamentations 3:23).

- God, I am grateful for your promise of forgiveness and how that keeps me close to you because ______.
 Thank you that I can empty my guilt, worry, and anxiety through confession. I'm grateful for your loving-kindness because ______.
- Lord, I pray that you would empower me to share any needed confessions with my children. Overwhelm me

with the truth that I can trust your loving-kindness to be new every morning. Please give me the words as I make things right with my children. Help me leave out any justification of my wrong.

Release Your Grip

May we love God's Word and live it out, especially as we forgive one another.

STORIES FROM A PARENT'S HEART

I n Greek, the word for *forgiveness* means "to release." Before, when I forgave, I released the person and the action but failed to release my pain. I forgave, but I still felt hurt later. I wasn't dealing with the pain associated with the hurt.

It's been difficult, but I've discovered that I need to share my pain with the Lord. It's not enough just to "gut it out" and forgive my offender. The Lord wants to heal the hurt that I've endured, and that requires I share it with Him. Jesus wants me to tell Him about my disappointment and let Him comfort me. He wants me to talk with Him about my rejection so He can remind me He understands how deeply I hurt.

One important step in my experience of forgiveness is to imagine myself alone in the garden of Gethsemane with Jesus. I "listen" as He shares His hurt and pain with the Father (see Matthew 26:36–39). Jesus shared His hurt with God, so it must be okay for me to do the same. I imagine the scene of the angels comforting our suffering Savior (see Luke 22:43–44). I'm then free to tell the Father about my own painful experiences and then wait until the God of all comfort pours His healing compassion over me. Finally, I reflect on how Jesus experienced this time of healing and comfort with the Father before He could offer forgiveness at the cross. In the same way, it is my experience of God's compassion and care first that allows me to truly forgive.

PRAY: LISTEN TO JESUS

I am so saddened when you experience hurt. I notice your pain and I hear your cries. Your painful experiences move my heart with compassion. If someone has hurt you, I want to comfort you and help you forgive. I am full of unfailing love for anyone who asks for my help. Make allowances for the faults of others. Forgive them and you will be forgiven. I know releasing is hard, but it's a matter of stewardship. My Father has granted you forgiveness, so now it's your turn to share His gift of forgiveness with others. Build Up

May we love God's Word and live it out, especially as we speak only words that edify one another.

STORIES FROM A PARENT'S HEART

L have worked diligently to model what it means to treat others the way I want to be treated—especially in how I speak to my kids. I try to speak only words that are truthful and kind.

First, I've realized that I must discern the need of the situation before I speak. Ephesians 4:29 tells us that we need to only speak words that fit the need of the moment. It's important that I listen to my child. Is he sad? Then I'll want to show him how much I care. Is she insecure? Then I'll want to reassure her of my love and presence. Is he angry about something? Then I'll want to carefully discern how my gentle answer can turn away his wrath (see Proverbs 15:1).

Second, I try to make sure the timing of my words is right. My child's receptivity to my words is often directly related to the timing of my speaking them. For example, I've learned that it's rarely a good idea to try to land any meaningful training with my kids when they are hungry or right before bedtime. I also have to tailor my words carefully if I need to address my kids' behavior when their friends are around. I don't want to cause feelings of embarrassment or disrespect.

Last, when I need to correct or address behavior, it needs to be done in a way that honors my children and builds them up as God's precious gifts.

PRAY: LISTEN TO JESUS

When I look at you, I celebrate the specialness of you, my creation. Scripture reveals how I'm generous with my edifying words for you. You are my chosen one. You are my masterpiece, the light of the world—holy, blameless, and complete. I want you to have this same view of the people around you. Look for their special qualities and build them up. Think carefully before saying anything that's harsh or unloving. My followers are careful to only speak words that edify those around them (see Proverbs 15:28; Ephesians 1:4; 2:10; Colossians 1:22; Ephesians 4:29).

- God, I'm grateful for your words of edification for me. Thank you for reminding me that you see me as ______.

Designer Genes

May we love God's Word and live it out, especially as we understand and give preference to one another.

STORIES FROM A PARENT'S HEART

6 od loves variety. He loves blond hair and blue eyes, brown hair and brown eyes, red hair and green eyes, tall, short, and everything in between. We were each carefully created by the Master Designer, according to His plan—no miscalculations or mistakes. In a sense, we all made our grand entrance into this world wearing designer genes.

These designer genes determine more than just our physical characteristics. Temperament is, for the most part, genetically determined. Some children are hardwired with extremely adaptable temperaments, while for many others change sends them into a tailspin. Some children are wired with predictable rhythms and eat and sleep on a consistent schedule, while other children have little predictability to their eating and sleeping schedules and don't seem to need much routine. A child's activity level, intensity of reaction, and tendency to approach or withdraw from something new are all aspects of a child's temperament that are hardwired by the Master Creator. If you notice a characteristic from birth, that's likely an indication of a child's divine genetic formation.

Here's what I've discovered is important about this "designer genes" perspective. Many times, my child's God-given, hardwired temperament may be completely different from my own or go entirely contrary to my preferences. In order for our home to be the peaceful, loving, and fun environment we all want, I have to

- understand the hardwired temperament of each child;
- accept differences, while lovingly, patiently, and prayerfully guiding behavior; and when possible,
- give preference to the hardwired temperament of my child.

PRAY: LISTEN TO JESUS

Remember, my beloved: I had equal status with my heavenly Father, but I didn't cling to that position. I exchanged my status and the privileges of deity and became human. I did this for you! I gave up myself and gave preference to you and to our relationship. I want this same kind of selflessness to be true of you too. Give preference to one another. Love deeply. Trust in me, and I will lift you up (see Romans 12:10; Philippians 2:1–11; 1 Peter 5:6).

Stamp of Approval

May we share God's love with others, especially as we speak words of approval.

STORIES FROM A PARENT'S HEART

A pproval means thinking and speaking well of others. It means commending someone because of who they are, apart from what they do. It means affirming the fact of and importance of a relationship. It's helpful to remember how the Father met the Son's need for approval.

Jesus stood in line with the rest of the followers waiting to be baptized. John the Baptist raised his hand and announced that Jesus of Nazareth was to be baptized that day. As Jesus came out of the water, the heavens opened up and the Spirit of God descended upon Him like a dove. And, out of nowhere, a thundering voice announced, "You are my Son, whom I love; with you I am well pleased" (Mark 1:11 NIV). The Father affirmed both the fact of and the importance of their relationship.

It's also important to notice that the Father initiated this contact. Jesus didn't have to ask for it. And one additional thing to notice is that the Father approved of His Son before the Son had done anything; this blessing came before Jesus had performed any miracles or healed or converted anyone. The Father gave His Son approval because of who He was, not for what He had done.

As the Father approved of the Son, so He approves of you and me. God has also met our ultimate need for approval, affirming us as saints, sons of the Most High, and people for God's own possession (see Romans 1:7; Ephesians 1:5; 1 Peter 2:9).

PRAY: LISTEN TO JESUS

I love you for who you are and apart from what you do. You don't have to do anything to earn my love, and you can't do anything to lose it. I know everything there is to know about you—your strengths and your weaknesses—and still it was the possibility of a relationship with you that brought me to Calvary. You are my beloved; you are chosen. I am pleased with you, and you are one in whom I delight (see Matthew 3:17; Exodus 33:17; Ephesians 1:7; I John 3:1).

Hugs and Kisses

STORIES FROM A PARENT'S HEART

A ffection means expressing care and closeness through appropriate, gentle touch or verbalized love. Demonstrating affection means leaving sweet notes, holding hands, rubbing your child's back, or initiating a late-night tickle session. It looks like giving hugs, kisses, and snuggles on the couch and wrestling for fun. It sounds like: "You're really special. I love you. You mean the world to me! You're God's gift for our family!" It might also include calling your son or daughter just because you wanted to hear their voice. Affection means doing the simple things that show your child that you care.

I've seen this to be true: When we meet our children's need for affection, they often feel more secure and feel free to give to others. As my kids have grown older, it became "uncool" to admit their need for affection. The need was there nonetheless, so I persevered. I gave hugs even when they didn't seem to like it. I still said I love you, but only in private. I want my children to look back and have plenty of memories of my love for them. Don't underestimate the power of your physical connection and verbalized love for your kids.

PRAY: LISTEN TO JESUS

My love for you is an everlasting love; I want you to experience how wide, long, high, and deep my love is for you. Imagine it's evening and you are sitting safely on a boat in the middle of the ocean. The sea is perfectly calm, and the stars are shining brightly. My love is like the horizon. It doesn't end; you just can't see it all at once. My love is higher than the stars; you'll never be able to reach its limits. My love goes on forever; there are no time constraints or expiration dates. My love is deeper than the ocean floor; you'll never reach its end. I love you with an everlasting love (see Isaiah 42:6; Jeremiah 31:3; 1 John 3:1; Ephesians 3:18).

Saying Thanks

May we share God's love in meaningful ways, especially as we give appreciation to one another.

STORIES FROM A PARENT'S HEART

I sn't it a great feeling to be appreciated for something you've done? There is hardly anything like it. We all love to get verbal pats on the back when we do something well. It's part of how we were made. We need others to notice our effort and give us verbal strokes. We need praise that is clear, strong, and accurate so we know beyond a doubt that we are being appreciated. Genuine appreciation is unselfish—an expression of our gratitude for the benefit of another.

One important element in true appreciation is the ability to demonstrate that we see what's right as often as we see what's wrong. If I were to appreciate Gabriel for consistently putting his dishes in the dishwasher, he would know I wasn't sincere. We buy paper plates because the trip from the table to the dishwasher is an often-forgotten journey. I still have to remind my son to clear his plate, so it would not be genuine if I were to praise him for it.

On the other hand, Gabe would feel loved if I were to express

my gratitude for how he worked hard on his science project or how he took out the trash without complaining. These words of appreciation affirm to Gabriel that I notice what's right as much as I notice what he misses or what is done wrong. Praise your children for the things they do well and the effort they make. Don't let your family come up short in appreciation.

PRAY: LISTEN TO JESUS

I am a God who sees. I see all your steps, I see all that you do and the effort you make, and I intercede on your behalf. You can count on me and my great name; I won't leave you or abandon you in the midst of all you do (see Genesis 16:13; Job 34:21; Romans 8:27).

Undivided Attention

May we share God's love in meaningful ways, especially as we give attention to one another.

STORIES FROM A PARENT'S HEART

I completed a painful assessment the other day. I asked myself how I was doing at meeting my children's need for attention more specifically, their need for me to listen. Do I give my kids individual, undivided, and consistent attention?

Individual Attention. Do I purposefully talk and listen to my kids when we are together? Just being in the house together doesn't count. In order to give individual attention, I must actively pursue a specific conversation with both my son and daughter—when I have no agenda other than to know them or more about their world— and be a willing participant in the conversation.

Undivided Attention. Do I make an effort to try to talk with my kids away from any potential interruptions? Do I concentrate on the conversation, or do I daydream, disengage, try to multitask, or look at my phone? Do I dominate the conversation or encourage my kids to talk about their day?

Consistent Attention. Do my children sense my willingness to give plenty of time to discuss difficult subjects, or do I give off signals that I just want them to get to the point? Does listening to my children include a caring heart and loving attitude or lots of advice and criticism? Do my children experience me as regularly available and ready to listen, or am I too often preoccupied or unreliable?

After doing such an assessment, I was sobered by the results. I realized that there were improvements that needed to be made in my life and in our family.

PRAY: LISTEN TO JESUS

I have set my love upon you. I will set you on high, because I know your name. You will call upon me, and I will hear you. I will be with you in trouble; I will deliver you and honor you. Remember, I lean in to listen to the needs of your heart. Cherish the thoughts I have about you—they are precious, rare, and beautiful. I think about you so often that you couldn't even begin to count them. Even if you tried, my thoughts about you would outnumber the sand of the seas (see Psalms 4:3; 91:14–15; 139:17–18).

Honor and Value

May we share God's love in meaningful ways, especially as we show respect to one another.

STORIES FROM A PARENT'S HEART

6 iving respect means valuing and regarding one another highly, treating others as important and honoring one another. The need for respect is not something that magically appears when a person turns twenty-one. We all need to be valued—from day one! Even small children need respect too.

Every child is a unique creation of God. Your children's value is greater than just being the son or daughter of their earthly parents. They're on loan from God, and He has a special plan for each of them. Part of meeting your children's need for respect is recognizing that many of their characteristics are part of their unique design. Children also need to experience respect in at least three distinct areas: their feelings, their opinions, and their possessions. Respect might sound like:

• "I'm listening. Your thoughts and feelings are important to me, and I want to hear them."

- "We'd like to know what you'd like to do on Saturday. We value your input."
- "I understand your need for privacy and your need to have things that belong to you."
- "Javier, you need to ask your brother's permission before you play with his toys."

Respect is never a one-way street, nor is it relinquishing your role as a parent. Respect includes creating an environment where a mom and dad clearly assume their role as parents, while valuing each child's unique design, individual feelings, opinions, and possessions. God intends for each of us to give respect as well as receive it.

PRAY: LISTEN TO JESUS

I place great value on our relationship; in fact, I call you my friend. I chose you and appointed you that you should go and bear fruit and bring honor to my name. Remember that when you call on me, I will rescue you and honor you because I love you. Before honor comes humility, so make sure that you see others as more important than yourself. Give honor to all people (see John 15:15–16; Psalm 91:15; Proverbs 18:12; Philippians 2:3; 1 Peter 2:17).

 Give choices whenever possible, not edicts: "Would you like to wear your boots or your tennis shoes?" or "What two stuffed animals would you like to give to the toy drive?"

Share the Load

May we share God's love in meaningful ways, especially as we support one another.

STORIES FROM A PARENT'S HEART

6 iving support means to come alongside and gently help with a problem or a struggle. It means providing appropriate assistance or help to a person in need.

Kids need a partner who will walk alongside them to help navigate the challenges on their path toward maturity. This does not mean completely shouldering the load for them. In the long run, doing so would actually become a hindrance rather than help, because it would convey the message, "This is too hard or too scary for you. You'd better stand aside while I take over." But neither should it mean standing at a distance while your child struggles alone. Rather, offering support involves conveying, both through words and actions, that you are with your child and that you want to assist with the challenges of life, no matter what.

Supporting children can sometimes mean showing them how to tie their shoes, how to change a tire, or how to use the microwave.

Giving support can include helping with homework (without doing it for them), helping with chores (without relieving them of the responsibility), and helping with any task or project that a child deems overwhelming.

God met our ultimate need for support by anticipating the great burden that we could not bear ourselves (the payment for our sins) and by providing the Holy Spirit to equip, comfort, and empower us.

PRAY: LISTEN TO JESUS

I will accomplish what concerns you. My loving-kindness is everlasting, so I will not forsake the works of my hands. I will equip you with everything good, that you may be able to do the things I have called you to do, work which is pleasing in my sight. As you receive my care and my support, be sure to offer support to others. Home Security

May we discern the relational needs of others and share God's love in meaningful ways, especially as we bring security to our home.

STORIES FROM A PARENT'S HEART

J 've discovered that giving security to a child means creating a home environment where there is harmony in relationships. It means creating a home where there is freedom from fear or threat of harm. A secure home is one where adults keep their promises, are dependable, and consistently provide for a child's physical, emotional, and financial needs.

A home that is secure also provides appropriate boundaries for behavior. Although they deny it, my children derive a sense of security from knowing where the limits are and knowing there are parents in their lives who care enough to set rules and actually enforce limits through loving discipline. If I want to effectively teach and train my children, these six things need to be a part of my discipline:

• Intimacy: Knowing my children and letting them know me is the foundation for all effective discipline.

- **Instruction:** My children need me to clearly and briefly explain what is expected of them. I can't just assume they know what to do.
- **Training:** My children often need a model or support in how to do what I have asked.
- Warning: My children need me to spell out the clear consequences that will occur if a behavior is not stopped or a task completed.
- **Correction:** My children need for me to follow through and implement the consequences that have been spelled out, with self-control, firmness, and without anger.
- **Reassurance:** After times of correction, my children need moments of reassurance about my love through words, hugs, and other expressions of love.

Appropriate discipline actually meets the need for security. I'm not going to hold my breath waiting for our children to thank me, but I can be confident that I am, indeed, meeting one of their deepest needs.

PRAY: LISTEN TO JESUS

I promise to never leave you or forsake you. I will always meet your needs for food, clothing, and shelter. I will be your ever-present help in times of trouble. You can count on me to be faithful, unchangeable, and constant. I give security for those who trust in me as their Savior. The mountains may be removed, and the hills may shake, but my loving-kindness will not be removed. My promise of peace will not be shaken. I will set you securely on high and protect you fiercely because you have known my name (see Psalms 46:1; 91:14–15; Lamentations 3:23; Hebrews 13:8; John 10:28; Isaiah 54:10).

STORIES FROM A PARENT'S HEART

No doubt you know the parable of the prodigal son. It goes something like this: The kid takes his trust fund and blows it on wine, women, and song, and winds up in a pigsty, then returns home to beg for food and employment. The most gripping scene in this biblical account is the one in which the father waits for his wayward son to return. We see the yearning on the father's face, the anxiety mixed with anticipation. Then one day, the father glances toward the road and sees his son coming home.

Reflect for a moment on your life. Have you had any "pigsty" moments? Have there been times when you were sure the Lord has had it with you, when you were scared that even begging His forgiveness wouldn't help? I certainly have. There have been plenty of times when I've just flat-out blown it—badly. Reconnect with your feelings during your "prodigal" moments: ashamed, sad, guilty, insecure, lost, anxious, and disconnected. Now picture the scene of the prodigal—you—coming home. You're coming down the road toward home. What do you see? It's your Father, and He's running toward you with outstretched arms. His face is relieved rather than strained or angry. He reaches you, embraces you, and holds you close to tell you how much He loves you. He's proud to call you His child. He's excited to see you. His love is unending and unwavering.

What feelings would that prompt in you? Gratefulness? Amazement? Humility? That is grace—a loving Father affirming the importance of a relationship with us in spite of our behavior.

PRAY: LISTEN TO JESUS

I couldn't bear the thought of heaven without you, so I gave you the ultimate gift. Remember, my gift of grace is new every morning; it never runs out. My grace is not something in the past. I'm available every moment to help you carry life's burdens and meet its challenges. Experience and receive my grace, honor me with your thanks, and then share my grace with others (see Lamentations 3:23; Psalms 50:23; 68:19; 1 Peter 4:10).

The Zacchaeus Principle

May we tell people about the Jesus who lives in us, specifically how He empowers us to look beyond faults and see needs.

STORIES FROM A PARENT'S HEART

2 acchaeus—a hated tax collector, a traitor to his own people, and a thief—was no doubt often ridiculed and attacked for his sins. Lonely and curious, he climbed a tree to get a good look at the Messiah as He passed by (see Luke 19:1–27). Zacchaeus had to wonder if Jesus would notice him. And if Jesus did, would He also reject him?

What a miracle Christ's call must have been to this outcast! Our Savior asked Zacchaeus to share a meal, inviting him into one of the most intimate social settings of the day. This simple invitation from Jesus was a deliberate offer of welcome, reception, and loving relationship. Jesus looked beyond the faults of Zacchaeus and saw his need.

In the midst of Zacchaeus' failures, Jesus offered compassion, companionship, and acceptance. It's interesting to note what Jesus *didn't* do that day: He didn't attack the tax collector's behavior,

point out things that were wrong with him, or even give helpful advice. He didn't remind Zacchaeus of what he should be doing or criticize him for not taking more responsibility. Jesus didn't quote Scripture to Zacchaeus or make comparisons with other tax collectors in town. He didn't try to manipulate change in Zacchaeus or withhold affection from him.

My children and I have experienced the blessing of the Zacchaeus principle—to look beyond someone's faults and see their needs. We frequently ask God for a fresh reminder of how He has looked beyond *our* faults, and then ask His help to do the same for others.

PRAY: LISTEN TO JESUS

I came to seek and to save you! I didn't wait until you shaped up or acted right. I looked beyond your faults and loved you while you were still a sinner. The world needs my kind of love; there's too much comparison, criticism, and selfishness. Look for opportunities to share how my love for you has changed your relationship with your children (see Luke 19:1–27; Romans 5:8).

- * Jesus, when I reflect on how you have looked past my faults and met my needs, I am filled with gratitude because _____. God, remind me of the awesome deeds you have done in my life and our family, particularly in how you have allowed me to look beyond faults and see needs.

In Spite of Differences

STORIES FROM A PARENT'S HEART

 \mathcal{D} uring Jesus' earthly ministry, He accepted people regardless of their differences. He cared about people regardless of their ethnicity, gender, social standing, or moral failures. He loved them unconditionally, forgave freely, and gently restored broken people to spiritual health.

One of the most powerful testimonies of God's work in our family has come out of this same challenge. We work hard to look beyond one another's faults. The closer we get to others, the more we notice their imperfections. In our family, we try to look past the other person's flaws and love in spite of those flaws. We also make a special effort to show acceptance. When a family member fails in some way or isn't as good as another person at a certain task, we try not to tease or belittle one another. These times are our opportunity to love a person anyway.

Finally, in our family, we look for people who are new or different from the group. Our priority is to include friends who are new to the school and invite people who are alone into the group. We even look for appropriate opportunities to spend time with friends or families who believe differently than we do. We want to be a family who moves toward those who are different but know that it's only Jesus who empowers us to show this kind of loving acceptance.

PRAY: LISTEN TO JESUS

Humble yourself, and I will lift you up. I love it when you acknowledge your dependence on me. I can't wait to come to your aid. I am ready to teach you my ways and lead you in how to celebrate the differences between you, your child, and others around you. Your humility is what moves me to action. I keep my distance from the proud. So talk freely about how you need me and how you are depending on me (see James 4:10; Psalms 25:9; 69:32; 138:6; Isaiah 55:8; 1 Peter 3:7).

STORIES FROM A PARENT'S HEART

B lended families face unique challenges. One of the ways to navigate these challenges is to set expectations appropriately. There are also many myths about stepfamilies, and one of those myths is the expectation of instant love. Just because you love your partner does not mean you'll automatically experience love with the children. We certainly had to overcome this myth and face this challenge as a blended family. It was only God who drew our family together.

It took more than seven years, but our family now has deep connections and close relationships between parents, stepparents, children, and stepchildren. Our family was born out of loss, which made our first years together pretty rocky, but Jesus brought peace to our family, stability to our relationships, and a special love for one another. Our family's story is one of challenge, heartache, and eventual hope. It's also a story that brings encouragement to many other families. My husband and I have discovered that as we are vulnerable about the struggles of our early years and the challenges we've endured, people want to hear more. When we tell about how we've overcome the conflict and the distance of relationships, people want to know how we did it. That's when we get to tell them about Jesus. It's only because of Him that our family loves. It's only because of Him that our family thrives.

PRAY: LISTEN TO JESUS

You can put your trust in me. I am faithful and trustworthy in all I do. I am so trustworthy that I am surrounded by faithfulness. When you don't know what to do or you don't know where to turn, come to me. Let your eyes and focus be on me. I am your source. I have enough. As we walk together through the struggles of this world, we'll show others what it looks like to be my disciple. When you love one another even when it's hard, people will become convinced that I am the source of love (see 2 Corinthians 1:18–20; Psalms 33:4; 89:8; 1 Peter 3:15).

There isn't a sport that my son doesn't like to watch or play. Any game, any time. He loves the action and the adrenaline. God has blessed him with a passion for sports and an ability to play several of them well.

Over the years, we've enjoyed the special opportunity to share Jesus with many of our friends. On long road trips with the team, we've talked with other parents about the joys and challenges of raising young men of integrity. We've laughed and cried together. We've celebrated with one another when our boys made good life choices and comforted one another when they didn't.

Long weekend tournaments gave us the chance to get to know whole families. My husband has helped repair a grandmother's roof, and I've helped care for newly adopted babies so a mom could watch the game.

The Art of the Question

May we tell people about the Jesus who lives in us, specifically as we share our lives and the gospel.

STORIES FROM A PARENT'S HEART

T 've discovered that I'm not very good at asking questions. I also discovered that my kids weren't great at it either. This became a problem when our family took seriously the command to share our faith. I had the motivation and sensed God's calling, and yet when it came to the practical step of starting and deepening conversations with people, I came up short.

In order to start a relationship where I had the freedom to share the gospel, I needed to know how to deepen relationships. I had to learn how to ask questions that moved our relationship from the surface to a deeper knowing of one another. Here's what I learned:

• Slow down. We all tend to rush past opportunities to make relational connections. So I had to slow down and take the time to *make* conversation.

- Ask more relational questions. We all tend to ask about facts, opinions, and information. I had to be intentional about asking about people's lives, their families, their feelings, and their needs.
- Listen. We all have a tendency to talk more than we listen. I had to change to learn to give my undivided attention to the people God places in my path.

These tips have helped me deepen my relationships with people. I've learned to connect with others in more meaningful ways, and God has provided incredible opportunities for me to share my life and the gospel.

PRAY: LISTEN TO JESUS

Look for people who might need you to share your life and the gospel. Begin by taking time to be with me. Next, be sure to share your life and the gospel with your spouse, children, and family. Then you'll want to share the good news with neighbors, coworkers, and people of your community. Share not only the salvation story but also the everyday blessings I bring to your life (see Matthew 28:19–20).

- * Jesus, make me more aware of the everyday blessings you bring to my life and then give me opportunities to tell about those blessings. I want to brag on my God about _____.

Kindness Is Powerful

May we tell people about the Jesus who lives in us, especially the gospel's power of kindness.

STORIES FROM A PARENT'S HEART

J esus tells the story of a man who is robbed and left for dead on the side of the road. Two religious men walk past the injured man without offering help, but a man from Samaria shows kindness and offers aid. The Samaritan bandages his wounds, takes him to an inn, and provides for his continued care.

What did the Samaritan man have that the religious leaders lacked? What motivated him? I think it was that the Samaritan had encountered the miraculous love of God and that he had never gotten over the wonder of God's abundant care for him. He was grateful for what God had done for him, which motivated him to care for others.

Are we still grateful for what God has done for us? Though we were still in sin, God selflessly gave His Son. Christ humbled Himself and left heaven to become a servant on our behalf, because His provision and care were exactly what we needed. He gave forgiveness, acceptance, love, and purpose in life.

Like the Samaritan, I can become genuinely sensitive to the needs of others—particularly my children—by being mindful that I am a blessed recipient of God's abundant kindness. It's sobering to think that because of Jesus, I hold within me the kindness others need: acceptance, security, comfort, encouragement, care, and love. On the other hand, to withhold these blessings or to be insensitive to others' needs is to behave just like the religious men of the Samaritan story, who ignored the needs of the injured man and thought only of themselves.

PRAY: LISTEN TO JESUS

It will be my heart of love, expressed through my people, that will draw a searching world to ask about me. So first, remember my kindness. I have provided all the acceptance, support, and comfort you need. Spend time meditating on my kindness toward you, and then demonstrate that kindness with your family. It's great practice for sharing my kindness with others!

When people who don't know me receive some of my acceptance, encouragement, comfort, and support delivered through you, they will begin to wonder, "Where did you get all that kindness?" At that point, you'll be ready to talk about the hope that is inside you. It's their experience of kindness that opens the door for the gospel (see 1 Peter 3:15; Romans 15:7; 2:4; Galatians 6:2; 2 Corinthians 1:3–4).

- Jesus, I'm overwhelmed by your kindness toward me, specifically how you _____.

APPENDIX 2

A SPIRIT-EMPOWERED FAITH

Expresses Itself in Great Commission Livina Empowered by Great Commandment Love



begins with the end in mind: The Great Commission calls us to make disciples.

"Go therefore and make disciples of all the nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit teaching them to observe all things that I have commanded you; and lo, I am with you always, even to the end of the age." (Matthew 28:19-20)

The ultimate goal of our faith journey is to relate to the person of Jesus, because it is our relational connection to Jesus that will produce Christlikeness and spiritual growth. This relational perspective of discipleship is required if we hope to have a faith that is marked by the Spirit's power.

Models of discipleship that are based solely upon what we know and what we do are incomplete, lacking the empowerment of a life of loving and living intimately with Jesus. A Spirit-empowered faith is relational and impossible to realize apart from a special work of the Spirit. For example, the Spirit-empowered outcome of "listening to and hearing God" implies relationship-it is both relational in focus and requires the Holy Spirit's power to live.



begins at the right place: The Great Commandment calls us to start with loving God and loving others.

"You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your mind.' This is the first and great commandment. And the second is like it: 'You shall love your neighbor as yourself.' On these two commandments hang all the Law and the Prophets."

(Matthew 22.37-40)

Relevant discipleship does not begin with doctrines or teaching, parables or stewardship—but with loving the Lord with all your heart, mind, soul, and strength and then loving the people closest to you. Since Matthew 22:37–40 gives us the first and greatest commandment, *a Spirit-empowered faith starts where the Great Commandment tells us to start: A disciple must first learn to deeply love the Lord and to express His love to the "nearest ones"—his or her family, church, and community (and in that order).*



embraces a relational process of Christlikeness.

Scripture reminds us that there are three sources of light for our journey: Jesus, His Word, and His people. The process of discipleship (or becoming more like Jesus) occurs as we relate intimately with each source of light.

"Walk while you have the light, lest darkness overtake you." (John 12:35)

Spirit-empowered discipleship will require a lifestyle of:

- Fresh encounters with Jesus (John 8:12)
- Frequent experiences of Scripture (Psalm 119:105)
- Faithful engagement with God's people (Matthew 5:14)



can be defined with observable outcomes using a biblical framework.

The metrics for measuring Spirit-empowered faith or the growth of a disciple come from Scripture and are organized/framed around four distinct dimensions of a disciple who serves.

And He Himself gave some to be apostles, some prophets, some evangelists, and some pastors and teachers, for the equipping of the saints for the work of ministry, for the edifying of the body of Christ. (Ephesians 4:11-12)

A relational framework for organizing Spirit-Empowered Discipleship Outcomes draws from a cluster analysis of several Greek (*diakoneo, leitourgeo, dou-leuo*) and Hebrew words (*'abad, Sharat*), which elaborate on the Ephesians 4:12 declaration that Christ's followers are to be equipped for works of ministry or service. Therefore, the 40 Spirit-Empowered Faith Outcomes have been identified and organized around:

- Serving/loving the Lord While they were ministering to the Lord and fasting (Acts 13:2 NASB).¹
- Serving/loving the Word But we will devote ourselves to prayer and to the ministry of the word (Acts 6:4 NASB).²
- Serving/loving people Through love serve one another (Galatians 5:13 NASB).³
- Serving/loving His mission Now all these things are from God, who reconciled us to Himself through Christ and gave us the *ministry* of reconciliation (2 Corinthians 5:18 NASB).⁴

A SPIRIT-EMPOWERED DISCIPLE LOVES THE LORD THROUGH

L1. Practicing thanksgiving in all things

Enter into His gates with thanksgiving (Ps. 100:4). *In everything give thanks* (1 Th. 5:18). *As sorrowful, yet always rejoicing* (2 Cor. 6:10).

L2. Listening to and hearing God for direction and discernment

"Speak, LORD, for Your servant hears" (1 Sam. 3:8–9). Mary, who also sat at Jesus' feet and heard His word (Lk. 10:38–42). And the LORD said, "Shall I hide from Abraham what I am doing ...?" (Gen. 18:17). But as the same anointing teaches you concerning all things ... (1 Jn. 2:27).

L3. Experiencing God as He really is through deepened intimacy with Him

"Hear, O Israel: The LORD our God, the LORD is one! You shall love the LORD your God with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your strength" (Deut. 6:4–5). Therefore the LORD will wait, that He may be gracious to you; and therefore He will be exalted, that He may have mercy on you. For the LORD is a God of justice ... (Is. 30:18). See also John 14:9.

L4. Rejoicing regularly in my identity as "His Beloved"

And his banner over me was love (Song of Sol. 2:4). To the praise of the glory of His grace, by which He made us accepted in the Beloved (Eph. 1:6). For so He gives His beloved sleep (Ps. 127:2).

L5. Living with a passionate longing for purity and to please Him in all things

Who may ascend into the hill of the LORD?... He who has clean hands and a pure heart (Ps. 24:3–4). Beloved, let us cleanse ourselves from all filthiness of flesh and spirit, perfecting holiness in the fear of God (2 Cor. 7:1). "I always do those things that please Him" (Jn. 8:29). "Though He slay me, yet will I trust Him" (Job 13:15).

L6. Consistent practice of self-denial, fasting, and solitude rest

He turned and said to Peter, "Get behind me, Satan! You are offense to Me, for you are not mindful of the things of God, but the things of men" (Mt. 16:23). "But you, when you fast ..." (Mt. 6:17). "Be still, and know that I am God" (Ps. 46:10).

L7. Entering often into Spirit-led praise and worship

Bless the LORD, O my soul, and all that is within me (Ps. 103:1). Serve the LORD with fear (Ps. 2:11). I thank You, Father, Lord of heaven and earth (Mt. 11:25).

L8. Disciplined, bold, and believing prayer

Praying always with all prayer and supplication in the Spirit (Eph. 6:18). "Call to Me, and I will answer you" (Jer. 33:3). If we ask anything according to His will, He hears us. And if we know that He hears us, whatever we ask, we know that we have the petitions that we have asked of Him (1 Jn. 5:14–15).

L9. Faithful stewardship and exercise of the gifts of the Spirit for empowered living and sacrifice

By one Spirit we were all baptized into one body—whether Jews or Greeks, whether slaves or free—and have all been made to drink into one Spirit (1 Cor. 12:13). "But you shall receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you" (Acts 1:8). But the manifestation of the Spirit is given to each one for the profit of all (1 Cor. 12:7). See also 1 Pet. 4:10 and Rom. 12:6.

L10. Practicing the presence of the Lord, yielding to the Spirit's work of Christlikeness

But we all, with unveiled face, ... are being transformed into the same from glory to glory, just as by the Spirit of the Lord (2 Cor. 3:18). As the deer pants for the water brooks, so pants my soul after You, O God (Ps. 42:1).



A SPIRIT-EMPOWERED DISCIPLE LIVES THE WORD THROUGH

W1. Frequently being led by the Spirit into deeper love for the One who wrote the Word

" 'You shall love the Lord your God' You shall love neighbor as yourself.' On these two commandments hang all the Law and the Prophets" (Mt. 22:37–40). And I will delight myself in Your commandments, which I love. (Ps. 119:47). "The fear of the LORD is clean More to be desired are they than gold ... sweeter also than honey" (Ps. 19:9–10).

W2. Being a "living epistle" in reverence and awe as His Word becomes real in my life, vocation, and calling

You are our epistle written in our hearts, known and read by all men (2 Cor. 3:2). And the Word became flesh and dwelt among us (Jn. 1:14). Husbands, love your wives ... cleanse her with the washing of water by the word (Eph. 5:25–26). See also Tit. 2:5. And whatever you do, do it heartily, as to the Lord and not to men (Col. 3:23).

W3. Yielding to the Scripture's protective cautions and transforming power to bring life change in me

Through Your precepts I get understanding; therefore I hate every false way (Ps. 119:104). "Let it be to me according to your word" (Lk. 1:38). How can a young man cleanse his way? By taking heed according to Your word (Ps. 119:9). See also Col. 3:16–17.

W4. Humbly and vulnerably sharing of the Spirit's transforming work through the Word

I will speak of your testimonies also before kings, and will not be ashamed (Ps. 119:46). *Preach the word! Be ready in season and out of season* (2 Tim. 4:2).

W5. Meditating consistently on more and more of the Word hidden in the heart

Your word I have hidden in my heart, that I might not sin against You (Ps. 119:11). Let the words of my mouth and the meditation of my heart be acceptable in Your sight, O LORD, my strength and my Redeemer (Ps. 19:14).

W6. Encountering Jesus in the Word for deepened transformation in Christlikeness

But we all, with unveiled face, ... are being transformed into the same image from glory to glory, just as by the Spirit of the Lord (2 Cor. 3:18). If you abide in Me, and My words abide in you, you will ask what you desire, and it shall be done for you (Jn. 15:7). See also Lk. 24:32, Ps. 119:136, and 2 Cor. 1:20.

W7. A life explained as one of "experiencing Scripture"

But this is what was spoken by the prophet Joel (Acts 2:16). This is my comfort in my affliction, for Your word has given me life (Ps. 119:50). My soul breaks with longing for Your judgements at all times (Ps. 119:20).

W8. Living "naturally supernatural" in all of life as His Spirit makes the written Word (*logos*) the living Word (rhema)

So then aith comes by hearing, and hearing by the word (rhema) of God (Rom. 10:17). Your word is a lamp to my feet and a light to my path (Ps. 119:105).

W9. Living abundantly "in the present" as His Word brings healing to hurt and anger, guilt, fear, and condemnation—which are heart hindrances to life abundant

"The thief does not come except to steal, and to kill, and to destroy" (Jn. 10:10). I will run the course of Your commandments, for You shall enlarge my heart (Ps. 119:32). "And you shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you free" (Jn. 8:32). Stand fast therefore in the liberty by which Christ has made us free, and do not be entangled again with a yoke of bondage (Gal. 5:1).

W10. Implicit, unwavering trust that His Word will never fail

"The grass withers, the flower fades, but the word of our God stands forever" (Is. 40:8). "So shall My word be that goes forth from My mouth; it shall not return to Me void" (Is. 55:11).



P1. Living a Spirit-led life of doing good in all of life: relationships and vocation, community and calling

Who went about doing good ... (Acts 10:38). "Let your light so shine before men, that they may see your good works and glorify your Father in heaven" (Mt. 5:16). "But love your enemies, do good, and lend, hoping for nothing in return; and your reward will be great, and you will be sons of the Most High. For He is kind to the unthankful and evil" (Lk. 6:35). See also Rom. 15:2.

P2. "Startling people" with loving initiatives to "give first"

"Give, and it will be given to you: good measure, pressed down, shaken together, and running over will be put into your bosom" (Lk. 6:38). Then Jesus said, "Father, forgive them, for they do not know what they do" (Lk. 23:34). See also Lk. 23:43 and Jn. 19:27.

P3. Discerning the relational needs of others with a heart to give of His love

Let no corrupt word proceed out of your mouth, but what is good for necessary edification, that it might impart grace to the hearers (Eph. 4:29). And my God shall supply all your need according to His riches in glory by Christ Jesus (Phil. 4:19). See also Lk. 6:30.

P4. Seeing people as needing BOTH redemption from sin AND intimacy in relationships, addressing both human fallen-ness and aloneness

But God demonstrates His own love toward us, in that while we were still sinners, Christ died for us (Rom. 5:8). And when Jesus came to the place, He looked up and saw him, and said to him, "Zacchaeus, make haste and come down, for today I must stay at your house" (Lk. 19:5). See also Mk. 8:24 and Gen. 2:18.

P5. Ministering His life and love to our nearest ones at home and with family as well as faithful engagement in His body, the church

Husbands, likewise, dwell with them with understanding, giving honor to the wife, as to the weaker vessel, and as being heirs together of the grace of life, that your prayers may not be hindered (1 Pet. 3:7). See also 1 Pet. 3:1 and Ps. 127:3.

P6. Expressing the fruit of the Spirit as a lifestyle and identity

But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, longsuffering, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, self-control (Gal. 5:22–23). A man's stomach shall be satisfied from the fruit of his mouth; From the produce of his lips he shall be filled (Prov. 18:20).

P7. Expecting and demonstrating the supernatural as His spiritual gifts are made manifest and His grace is at work by His Spirit

In mighty signs and wonders, by the power of the Spirit of God, so that from Jerusalem and round about to Illyricum I have fully preached the gospel of Christ (Rom. 15:19). "Most assuredly, I say to you, he who believes in Me, the works that I do he will do also" (Jn. 14:12). See also 1 Cor. 14:1.

P8. Taking courageous initiative as a peacemaker, reconciling relationships along life's journey

Be at peace among yourselves (1 Th. 5:13). For He Himself is our peace, who has made both one, and has broken down the middle wall of separation (Eph. 2:14). Confess your trespasses to one another, and pray for one another, that you may be healed (Jas. 5:16).

P9. Demonstrating His love to an ever growing network of "others" as He continues to challenge us to love "beyond our comfort"

He who says, "I know Him," and does not keep His commandments, is a liar, and the truth is not in him (1 Jn. 2:4). If someone says, "I love God," and hates his brother, he is a liar; for he who does not love his brother whom he has seen, how can he love God whom he has not seen? (1 Jn. 4:20).

P10. Humbly acknowledging to the Lord, ourselves, and others that it is Jesus in and through us who is loving others at their point of need

"Take My yoke upon you and learn from Me, for I am gentle and lowly in heart, and you will find rest for your souls" (Mt. 11:29). "If I then, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also ought to wash one another's feet" (Jn. 13:14).



A SPIRIT-EMPOWERED DISCIPLE LIVES HIS MISSION THROUGH

M1. Imparting the gospel and one's very life in daily activities and relationships, vocation and community

So, affectionately longing for you, we were well pleased to impart to you not only the gospel of God, but also our own lives, because you had become dear to us (1 Th. 2:8–9). See also Eph. 6:19.

M2. Expressing and extending the kingdom of God as compassion, justice, love, and forgiveness are shared

"I must preach the kingdom of God to the other cities also, because for this purpose I have been sent" (Lk. 4:43). "As You sent Me into the world, I also have sent them into the world" (Jn. 17:18). Restore to me the joy of Your salvation, and uphold me by Your generous Spirit. Then I will teach transgressors Your ways, and sinners shall be converted to You (Ps. 51:12–13). See also Mic. 6:8.

M3. Championing Jesus as the only hope of eternal life and abundant living

"Nor is there salvation in any other, for there is no other name under heaven given among men by which we must be saved" (Acts 4:12). "The thief does not come except to steal, and to kill, and to destroy. I have come so that they may have life, and that they have it more abundantly" (Jn. 10:10). See also Acts 4:12 and Jn. 14:6.

M4. Yielding to the Spirit's role to convict others as He chooses, resisting expressions of condemnation

"And when He has come, He will convict the world of sin, and of righteousness, and of judgment" (Jn. 16:8). Who is he who condemns? It is Christ who died, and furthermore is also risen, who is even at the right hand of God, who also makes intercession for us (Rom. 8:34). See also Rom. 8:1.

M5. Ministering His life and love to the "least of these"

"Then He will answer them saying, 'Assuredly, I say to you inasmuch as you did not do it to one of the least of these, you did not do it to Me'" (Mt. 25:45). Pure and undefiled religion before God and the Father is this: to visit orphans and widows in their trouble, and to keep oneself unspotted from the world (Jas. 1:27).

M6. Bearing witness of a confident peace and expectant hope in God's lordship in all things

Now may the Lord of peace Himself give you peace always in every way. The Lord be with you all (2 Thess. 3:16). And let the peace of God rule in your hearts, to which also you were called in one body; and be thankful (Col. 3:15). See also Rom. 8:28 and Ps. 146:5.

M7. Faithfully sharing of time, talent, gifts, and resources in furthering His mission

Of which I became a minister according to the stewardship from God which was given to me for you, to fulfill the word of God (Col. 1:25). "For everyone to whom much is given, from him much will be required" (Lk. 12:48). See also 1 Cor. 4:1–2.

M8. Attentive listening to others' story, vulnerably sharing of our story, and a sensitive witness of Jesus' story as life's ultimate hope; developing your story of prodigal, preoccupied and pain-filled living; listening for others' story and sharing Jesus' story

But sanctify the Lord God in your hearts, and always be ready to give a defense to everyone who asks you a reason for the hope that is in you, with meekness and fear (1 Pet. 3:15). "For this my son was dead and is alive again" (Luke 15:24). See also Mk. 5:21–42 and Jn. 9:1–35.

M9. Pouring our life into others, making disciples who in turn make disciples of others

"Go therefore and make disciples of all the nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all things that I commanded you; and Io, I am with you always, even to the end of the age" (Mt. 28:19–20). See also 2 Tim. 2:2.

M10. Living submissively within His body, the Church, as instruction and encouragement; reproof and correction are graciously received by faithful disciples

Submitting to one another in the fear of God (Eph. 5:21). Brethren, if a man is overtaken in any trespass, you who are spiritual restore such a one in a spirit of gentleness, considering yourself lest you also be tempted (Gal. 6:1). See also Gal. 6:2.


